Formal Parents' Evening and Interim Written Reports

As promised in a communication towards the end of last term, I have asked the teachers to prepare an interim written report which will be shared at a formal parents' evening in the first term. These arrangements have been made in recognition of the disruption caused due to the COVID19 pandemic last academic year.

Monday 19th October (4pm - 7pm)

As I'm sure you can appreciate, after all afternoon in the classroom, the teachers will require a short break and an opportunity to prepare for the Parents' Evening; as such, once the children have been dismissed at the end of the school day, the doors for the school will be closed, re-opening for the Parents' Evening at 4pm. Doors will be locked again from 6.50pm onwards.

Tuesday 20th October (4pm - 5.30pm)

There will be a shorter parents' evening on Tuesday to meet with any parents who were unable to attend on the Monday. Again, once the children have been dismissed at the end of the school day, the doors for the school will be closed, re-opening for the Parents' Evening at 4pm. Doors will be locked again from 5.20pm onwards.

Appointment sheets will remain available in the Main Entrance Area until Friday 16th October. Parents will be able to sign up to an appointment with the teachers they would like to see. Please can school request that the appointment sheet is filled in by parents and not their children. Any parents who have not made an appointment by Friday 16th October will be contacted by telephone and offered free slots. Obviously if you do not sign up for an appointment for a time of your choosing, the slots offered to you by telephone may not be as convenient to you. Our expectation is that every child will be represented by a parent at one of the two evenings, and we encourage you to sign up for an appointment as soon as possible.

Hop Tu Naa / Conker Day - extra information

In recent years we've noticed that some of the children's costumes are becoming less and less traditional. Ours is intended as a Manx Hop Tu Naa celebration, not Halloween or an American style Trick or Treat occasion. We have sent home some additional information about the Manx Hop Tu Naa which may be of interest and help in this regard. If children don't have costumes / outfits or don't wish to dress up, then they can opt for non-uniform clothes instead. This is entirely for fun, and we are not asking for donations to dress up. We will hold some traditional Hop Tu Naa activities in the hall in the afternoon, and we will award prizes for the best costumes.

We will also hold our annual conker competition on the Friday. A limited number of conkers will be available in school, but children are encouraged to bring their own in. Conker competitions will take place in classrooms, with the winners of each class taking part in the main contest in front of the whole school. It is free to take part and is just a bit of fun for the end of the first half of term. Children in Reception and YI are going to watch the conker competition rather than participate.
