Simile Poems

What is a simile poem?

A simile poem is a type of poetry that compares two things using the words 'like' or 'as'. A simile poem is very simple to write. As long as you are comparing one thing to another, you can consider it a simile poem. Simile poems may include objects, animals or events.

What is the structure of a simile poem?

Simile poems contain several lines. There is no rule about the number of lines you can write. Each line of a simile poem needs to use the words 'like' or 'as' and needs to compare an object to something else. After a comparison is made, there needs to be an explanation for this. Simile poems do not need to rhyme.

An example of a simile poem:

She is like a ballerina always moving around so graciously,

She is as fit as a fiddle lifting me high above her head and spinning me around,


She is like a shining star always brightening up my day,

She is as a funny as a clown always making me laugh,

She is as neat as a pin making sure everything is where it needs to be,

She is as precious as gold and my favourite sister in the whole wide world,

My older sister.
