As part of our daily offer (see timetable below) I have planned activities with a literacy or numeracy focus:

*Literacy grid resources are focused around reading five different text types with follow up questions and activities.

- **Day 1** 'In Flanders Fields' Historical narrative text with questions.
- Day 3 'Hunted' A dramatic short story with follow up activities.
- **Day 5** 'The Parthenon' Historical information text with questions.
- Day 7 'The Highwaymen' Narrative poem with sequencing activity

Day 9 - 'Galapagos Island Tortoise' - Non-fiction text and questions.

I have also suggested an **<u>extra challenge</u>** linked to each of these texts:

*<u>Numeracy grid resources</u> focus upon number and calculation skills, including mental and written addition, subtraction, multiplication and division skills. I have also included knowledge organisers linked to these areas, which I hope you will find informative and useful. Notice how tasks provide different levels of challenge.

- Day 2 Multiples, factors and times tables.
- **Day 4** Multiply and divide by 10, 100 or 1000.
- **Day 6** Mental and written addition and subtraction.
- Day 8 Solving subtraction word problems.
- Day 10 Solving word problems.

I will review and update resources for days 11 to 15 in due course.

Suggested daily timetable:

Each 'school day' aim to complete:

- <u>Daily live online lesson (approx. 45 mins)</u> - The focus for these will vary, but will include **recommendations for learning and challenges which may be completed before the following day.

- <u>1 to 2 hours</u> - Working on literacy <u>or</u> numeracy activities from the literacy and numeracy grids as outlined above. (If spending more that 1 hour, you could return to this later.)

30 minutes reading

<u>1 hour</u> - **Learning recommendations/ challenges which may include Oak Academy lessons via the school website (archived from March 2020), BBC Bitesize or studying a science knowledge organiser, ready for questions the next day.

<u>1 hour</u> - Variety of activities, which may include board/ maths games or practising times tables. You may also like to watch a documentary and/or research areas you have been learning about in school, such as history (ancient civilisations). Don't forget to have breaks and downtime throughout the day too.
