## **Adult Guidance and Answers**

Whodunnits are stories in which the reader acts as a detective to solve the crime. If this is the first time that your class are completing a whodunnit, it may be worth explaining to them that they will be looking for clues in the text in order to solve the crime alongside Detective Dunnit. Encourage them to underline anything that they think could be an important clue as they're reading through the text.

When they have read the text, they will need to complete the deductions sheet, much like a real detective. This requires them to think about each suspect's alibi so that they can pick out the person who isn't telling the truth. Finally, they will need to provide evidence which backs up their deduction.

While your class are helping Detective Dunnit, you may want to provide them with a clue. The clue for this whodunnit is 'dates'.

Below, is the answer for **Whodunnit? The Mystery of the Missing Painting**. Read this section aloud when every child has made their deduction.

## **Whodunnit? The Mystery of the Missing Painting Answer**

Carlos called the four suspects into his office. Looking around at all of them, Dunnit announced, "There is no doubt in my mind that the person who took the painting is in this room." Immediately, they began to look at one another. "It appears that someone was hoping that I knew nothing about the gallery when they gave me their alibi.
